What is the Haka and why do New Zealand All Blacks perform it before every match they play?

The New Zealanders will perform the Haka when they face the lions. Warren Gatland's assembled team from the UK and Ireland continue their build up into the first test match against the Maori All Blacks next week, with a game against the Maori All Blacks tomorrow morning. And like their first four games, they will be met by the Haka before kick-off in what is one of sport's greatest and most spectacular sights. But where has the Haka originated from, and why is it performed and adored by the people of New Zealand, both in and outside of rugby?

What is it?

The Haka is a traditional war cry and dance that is seen as a challenge from the Maori people, and describes the ancestors and events from the history of the tribe. Performed by the national side before every kick-off, the dance involves the stamping of feet, slapping of hands on the body and several facial contortions involving the tongue and eyes.

It generally begins with the words: "Ka mate! Ka mate! Ka ora! Ka ora!", which means: "I die! I die! I live! I live!"

What are the origins?

It was first performed by the New Zealand Native rugby team in 1888 and 1889. Up until 1986 it was only used by the All Blacks at away matches, but it is now an integral part of their pre-match ritual for every game. The original Haka was composed in the early 19th Century by a Maori warrior chief called Te Rauparaha.
